

Summer and Celebration is an art exhibition that explores celebration as a way of comprehending life in the time of radical societal and personal change. After two years of unexpected and often confusing events the exhibition simply asks: how was summer?

Via media of performance, installation, painting, sound art and sculpture seven artists will create snapshots into summer 2022. Speaking from subjective points of view the group offers a multifaceted and evocative exhibition where the spectrum of experience goes from playfulness to mourning.

Collectively the artworks in the exhibition reflect on the experience of coming together to celebrate. They take note of the pleasure of communal festivity and ritual, as well as private experiences of joy, contentment and sense of achievement. Summer invites us to celebration as a fundamental human activity but there is no celebration without lament.



You've got nothing to prove but your ____' (2022) as part of the ongoing exploration 'BROWN/WHITE LOVE'

This summer I broke in two as I gathered with my Punjabi family to mourn the sudden loss of my father, my English father, my white father. You've got nothing to prove (2022) marks a shift in my practice, a shift in me as I navigate Britishness through the lense of cultural exile,

extrication, fugitivity, and mourning that accompany an interracial existence at this particular moment in history. I have been thinking about grief beyond solely the death of my father, but also as grief for a pre-colonial past, grief for a love that was always meant to be stifled. Always meant to be uneasy. Suspicious. Mad.

Ziggurrettes, Film on a loop

With mindfulness breathing, a traditionally Buddhist meditation, as a counter-reference, smoking might be considered secular Western culture's closest manifestation of intentional breathing. The covid-19 pandemic has made us mindful of the effects of our breath. The smoke from a cigarette likewise makes us

mindful of our breath, the invisible part of ourselves, shrouded in smoke. Smoking is a curious phenomenon - playing with breath as a hobby, a defiance or a celebration. A series of found-footage montages, Ziggurettes, an overlap of the word cigarette and ziggurat, explores the spiritual resonances of breath and smoke. The cigarette-break and the ziggurat both act as spaces away from the everyday, set aside for rumination, rest and reflection.
